<p><b>A</b></p> 	<p><b>1</b> no one under 18 is allowed to see or rent the film</p>
<p><b>B</b></p> 	<p><b>2</b> suitable for everyone but some parts of the film might be unsuitable for children - their parents should decide</p>
<p><b>C</b></p> 	<p><b>3</b> children under 12 years old are not allowed to see or rent the film unless they are with an adult</p>
<p><b>D</b></p> 	<p><b>4</b> suitable for anyone aged 4 years and over</p>
<p><b>E</b></p> 	<p><b>5</b> children under 15 years old are not allowed to see or rent the film</p>

### Additional information:

Films in the UK have a system to show if they are suitable for children. This is called the classification system. If a child is below the age of the classification, they should not watch the film at a cinema or on DVD.

The British Board of Film Classification (BBFC) is an independent, non-governmental body, which has classified cinema films since it was set up in 1912, and videos since the passing of the Video Recordings Act in 1984.
